INTRODUCTION AND WELCOME

Like many of us I suspect, I went to the National Grid Ventures 'LionLink' presentation at the Village Hall back on Friday, 22nd September to see what all the fuss was about. Bringing huge electricity cables ashore north of Southwold Pier, and taking them in huge, motorway-width trenches through our countryside to an 'interconnector' sub-station near Aldeburgh . . . what could possibly go wrong? In fact, I was very disturbed that amongst the myriad of maps, diagrams and bullet points, there was no account of the environmental impact, even desecration you could say, of our local environment and Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty.

This shows why we should not take anything in our area for granted. Constant vigilance is needed. If we take our eye off the ball, much could be lost. Reydon Parish Council is working hard to keep things the way we feel the community wants them.

But 'LionLink' is a different sort of threat, as the article on pp. 6-8 explains, and we want to hear from you, the residents of Reydon, to let us know what you think we should be doing about all this. For this reason, we are holding a public meeting at Reydon Village Hall on Friday, 27th October, doors open 6.30 for 7pm start. Please put this in your diary.

Elsewhere we have ongoing problems at Potters Bridge, due it seems to a standoff between the Environment Agency and the local landowner (more about that in the next edition of The Reydon Robin).

But it is not all bad. Since the May elections, Reydon, Southwold and Walberswick have all started to work more closely together on common issues, as shown by the Southwold Market Tourist Information Stall over the summer (see the cover and p.13). Then there is the continuing success of the Reydon and Southwold Community Fridge and Pantry (see p.4).

I want to also give our grateful thanks to Ben Cooper of Cooper and Denny for repairing, free of charge, the broken furniture on the Reydon Rec. following some mindless vandalism.

This is how we keep our area special, through people caring and pulling together. When we don't do this is when we should start to worry.

THE 'LIONLINK' CHALLENGE

On Friday, 22nd September, National Grid Ventures (NGV: 'LionLink') put on a comprehensive, even baffling, display at Reydon Village Hall to explain proposals to bring electricity cables from Holland to come ashore (landfall) to a new interconnector station just north of Southwold Pier.

Several landfall locations are under consideration: here at Easton Bavents, at Walberswick, at Aldeburgh and at Bradwell on Sea, despite the power being required in London.

Marc Vlessing writes:

It is in the nature of these large infrastructure projects that even the most informed people often don't understand all the complexities of what they have been asked to consider. I spoke to the Director of Operations at NGV who had not been anywhere near e.g. Rissemere Lane, Reydon on the day I met him at our Village Hall. Small wonder he hadn't appreciated the impact of the proposed cable corridor which is shown to cut through people's driveways, let alone front gardens, on our local environment.

Complex projects are often met by fear and heightened speculation so to help understand more, a number of us got together to establish RAID (Reydon Against Invasive Destruction) with the following remit:

- 1) to understand the environmental & economic impacts of the proposed route;
- 2) to work together with neighbouring stakeholders in Walberswick, Aldeburgh and beyond to pool knowledge and resources;
- 3) to raise funds to manage our expert witness contributions to the planning process which may lie ahead;
- 4) to look at international comparisons to understand and propose best practice alternatives;
- 5) to stay in regular touch with you, our local residents; and
- 6) finally, if NGV decide to go ahead, we should seek an accommodation to bring about the best possible outcome for us.

This article cannot explain in detail what the 'LionLink' proposals are and how they might affect us all locally. There's plenty of information online. A copy of the NGV 'LionLink' plans can also be found at Reydon Village Hall.

So at this point, we know that NGV's proposal would make landfall just north of Southwold Pier, then would run in a trench 40+ metres wide through our countryside to Friston via Wangford, Uggeshall, Wenhaston and beyond. Friston is being proposed as the site for a new distribution centre, though this is by no means a done deal and subject to a series of Judicial Reviews. In reality, Friston is a tranquil, beautiful medieval village close to Aldeburgh and the Sandlings, which are rare low heathlands. This deeply rural oasis was presented by Scottish Power in the Development Consent Order (DCO) Examinations in 2020 as a 'semi-industrialised village', which it clearly is not.

Unfortunately, NIMBYism is not enough; we need to understand the proposition

properly and respond to it accordingly. Luckily, we have help from an organisation called Suffolk Energy Action Solutions - SEAS - established as a Community Group in July 2019 and led by Fiona Gilmore, who has been lobbying hard over the years to get politicians and utilities to think a lot harder about the genuine electrification needs of our country in the years and decades to come. The distribution centre at Friston, for instance, forms an integral part of the plans currently under consideration and without it, it's highly likely that none of the proposed transmission networks will go ahead. So this is a complex picture to get on top of.

SEAS was established to promote more modern offshore solutions and brownfield sites for wind energy delivery, storage and connections to the grid. It seeks to represent all communities across coastal Suffolk, including RAID and WALL (Walberswick Against 'LionLink'), and also supports SASES and SOS, those community groups set up in 2019 to protect Friston and nearby Sandlings from needless harm.

SEAS believes that environmental damage can be avoided if Britain follows the lead taken by Belgium and Holland who are already implementing Modular Offshore Grids (MOGs). The only reason the current point-to-point plans are being pushed forward by National Grid appears to be because they are easier and cheaper in the short term.

Throughout these last four years, SEAS has witnessed the disingenuous behaviour of developers who have been allowed by Government (ie DESNZ - The Department for Energy Security and Net Zero) to get consent orders to ride roughshod over our countryside and communities by using the argument that 'it's cheaper for the consumer'.

Comparative evidence from Belgium's National Grid equivalent called ELIA (who have a national master plan, unlike Britain) suggests that offshore grids pooling energy at sea from two or three wind farms and taking energy to brownfield sites is cheaper, more efficient and a faster solution. These grids are flexible, expandable (hence any reference to meshed grids) and more secure.

So where do we go next with all of this? Tourism is this area's principal revenue source, and with congested roads and drilling to match, visitors will be inclined to go elsewhere. As to our environment and coastal conditions: local people know best what a project like 'LionLink' could mean for our fragile ecology. In short, we can't sit back.

Yes, we need our power and our green energy. But we also need to be more intelligent as a country in the way we deliver our energy to the places that need it most. We need an infrastructure master plan with brownfield sites, such as the Isle of Grain, Tilbury and Bradwell, that are much closer to energy demand and where there are many fewer development issues.

The good news is this: it is not too late to challenge. National Grid would like us to think it's a done deal, but it is not. With two outstanding Judicial Reviews, there is everything to fight for. Ultimately, all of these proposals will have to be reviewed by Government and our latest Secretary of State (our sixth since 2019),

Clare Coutinho, will want to look at that process very seriously, as will Ed Miliband if, as many expect, he will be in that job in 12 months' time.

We should also challenge our local Suffolk MPs, especially Thérèse Coffey, to redouble their efforts - none of them are considered to have particularly safe seats anymore (Suffolk Coastal only needs a 17% swing, Ipswich less than 6%). So 'LionLink plus' Friston and all the energy projects for Suffolk could well see them lose their seats if they do not represent their constituents well on these thorny issues.

So do come to Reydon Village Hall on 27th October at 7pm and please don't despair - there is every reason to believe that good sense and value for money will come together to provide a long-term solution that works for our community beyond the short term.

EAST SUFFOLK COUNCIL

It has been a very busy summer since we took East Suffolk Council in May. We have set the tone with constructive and deliberative debate embracing the views and advice of opposition councillors. I have been delving into the depths of my brief, the housing department, searching for those elusive 500 extra social homes we have promised in the next four years.

It ain't going to be easy. We can't afford to build houses for the rents the Government is prepared to pay in housing benefit, which has been frozen since 2019. I am hoping to get a green light for another 25 homes on Green Lane as we have the longest waiting lists in east Suffolk. Larger developments like Copperwheat are stalled because of the economic climate. Saint Felix drags on. We are searching for empty homes or cheap sales to help us face a doubling of demand for temporary accommodation as more people are evicted.

To top it all, the previous administration has left a £9-million debt because they overcharged tenants, and a high-rise block in Lowestoft which is probably now beyond repair.

Meanwhile Sizewell C looms, Potters Bridge floods, the National Grid wants to dig up our countryside and Anglian Water still dumps sewage into the Harbour.

On the bright side, I now chair the Harbour Committee, so we can make it work for the local community at last, as well as chairing the Suffolk Coastal Forum. And as far 'LionLink' is concerned, East Suffolk Council voted last week to support the Offshore Grid proposal, which is by far the best solution for our coastline and our district.

We are also grasping the traffic-and-parking nettle in Southwold, the Skatepark is being built and the Pantry is thriving in the Village Hall. *Cllr. David Beavan*

THE REYDON NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN & HOUSING ISSUES

For proposed new houses, whether single or part of a larger development, the Parish Council insists on a key policy from our Neighbourhood Plan: that every new dwelling should be occupied as a Principal Residence. This aims to reduce the pressure on the community from the number of second homes, now around 35% of housing in the village.

Recently, a developer challenged this policy. Together with East Suffolk, we strongly defended our policy to the Planning Inspectorate which determines such appeals. We are glad to report that the appeal was rejected and our policy continues to apply to new housing in the village.

Polio kills and paralyses young children. It spreads like wildfire. There is no cure, but it can be easily prevented through immunisation. Twenty-five years ago, polio affected 350,000 each year.

Thanks to the work of Rotary and others there were only 74 cases in 2015. Today, we are now close to a polio-free world.

2023 Flu Campaign

The practice should receive its supply of influenza vaccinations at the end of September. Clinics for patients are expected to be on Saturday, 30th September and Saturday, 7th October.

Eligible patients will be invited to attend by letter or text message throughout August and September. There is no need to contact the practice regarding your invitation, unless you think you are eligible and have not heard from the practice directly by the clinic dates.

Those patients aged 50-64 years and not in a clinical-risk group are no longer eligible for the influenza vaccination as they were during the Covid pandemic. This is direct advice from the Department of Health.

Once we receive the National Guidance about the Covid Autumn Booster Campaign, we will share this information with you.
