LIONLINK - THE PUBLIC MEETING

The Autumn Reydon Robin reported on the consultation held at Reydon Village Hall on Friday 22nd September. On display were National Grid Ventures' (NGV) 'LionLink' proposals, to bring electricity cables ashore from Holland to a new interconnector site north of Southwold Pier. The cables would then be carried in motorway-wide trenches, either across the top of Reydon and around Henham, the 'northern route', or underneath the Blyth Estuary and then, in both options, on to the proposed substation Friston, near Aldeburgh.

Not surprisingly, this has provoked huge local concerns, especially as the glossy proposals put forward by NGV did not account for the fullimpact on the local wildlife sites



and AONBs; nor did they provide any comparative costs for an alternative under-sea network.

Over 170 residents turned out on Friday 27th Oct.to hear the cogent arguments against 'LionLink' from Marc Vlessing, a Reydon resident and founder of R.A.I.D. (Reydon Against Invasive Destruction) and Fiona Gilmore from SEAS (Suffolk Energy Action Solutions) www.suffolkenergyactionsolutions.co.uk

SEAS is campaigning, on our behalf, at all potentially threatened coastal locations, e.g. Walberswick, Aldeburgh, Friston and Saxmundham, and Fiona Gilmore not only encouraged everyone to write letters of objection to NGV and Andrew Bowie, The Energy Minister, she also presented their arguments again the proposals and highlighting the flaws in NGV's case. SEAS is campaigning for an under-sea network, which has been built so successfully in Belgium and Holland, which will take the UK power cables to a brownfield site, such as Bradwell in Essex.

REMARKABLE TREES IN REYDON

Most homes will have a Christmas Tree this year, either cut specially for Christmas or even a pre-lit artificial tree. The tradition of a decorated Christmas tree began, not with Prince Albert, but much earlier by Lutheran Christians in the 16th Century.

Amongst cut trees, the Nordmann Fir has become a popular choice because it holds on to its needles, more so than the traditional Norwegian Spruce. The icy blue needles of the Blue Spruce offer a distinctly different coloured tree, whilst the upright branches and long needles of a Lodgepole Pine make a decidedly elegant (if more difficult to decorate) tree. The Norwegian Spruce has the best Christmassy scent.

If sustainability is your choice, be sure to buy pot grown trees if you are able. Some trees labelled 'potted' will have been recently dug up, and their survival beyond Xmas will be compromised by the inevitable damage to their roots. Living trees should ideally be kept in a cooler room and the soil should be kept moist.

SUFFOLK LIBRARY SERVICES

Suffolk County Council has launched a public consultation encouraging Suffolk Residents to let the County Council know what they want from their Library services in the future.

Suffolk County Council's contract with *Suffolk's Libraries Industrial* and *Provident Society (IPS) Limited*, the independent charity that runs the Library service, comes to an end on 31 May 2025, with a new contract set to begin in June 2025.

The 13-week consultation, will be followed by a competitive Tender Process, before the new contract is awarded in November 2024.

POTTERS BRIDGE - B1127 Lowestoft Road

The Potters Bridge flooding saga continues . . . after being obstructed by the landowners, Mr and Mrs Jones for more than a year, The Environment Agency finally got a Court Warrant to access their land to get a digger on to it, to clear the outfall last month so that Easton Broad could drain into the sea.

Unfortunately, the surge tide of Friday, November 24th broke over the beach and filled the Broad again with sea water. This caused a dangerous depth on the Lowestoft Road of 0.75m at high water overnight. Two cars were swamped as they hit the flood in the dark. Luckily no-one was hurt. This is a sign of things to come as the road is below high water and will flood at each tide if the beach is permanently breached by the increasing number of surge tides and onshore storms.

The other problem is that rainfall running down the road gets trapped because the drains have been blocked for over a year. There are weeds growing out of them. We bombarded the Suffolk Highways reporting tool and they have now promised to unblock them as soon as the flooding allows. They will also inspect the road which appears to be sinking into the marsh.

Our depth meter sits over the broad, not the road, where it would get run over, so it can read a low level whilst there is still flooding on the road. You can find this at: https://reydonvillage.org

Wolsey Bridge is also below high water and the only high road into Reydon is through Wangford. We need a long-term solution to anticipate sea level rise, rather than dealing with emergencies and risking lives. **David Beavan, Cllr. East Suffolk Council**

NATURE NOTES

Beware when putting on your gardening gloves, or wellies, just in case there's a spider inside! Spiders are predators, and with the same venom they use to disable their prey, some spiders - e.g. a false widow spider, will bite, but only if threatened and cannot escape.



The resulting bite can be extremely painful note the bite marks at the base of the little finger. No British spiders' bites are fatal, but do turn your gloves inside out or shake your boots - I will in future! Is our seasonal Winter weather a distant memory? Now it is more like the merging of Autumn and Spring, with the occasional cold snap or a beastly Easterly. Still we do get the occasional treat:



Several years ago on a cold snowy morning, to the delight of many birders, these Smew put in an appearance

on Southwold Model Yacht Pond, on their winter migration. The handsome black and white males arrived together with the red tufted females, fondly know as Redheads (not shown).

These scarce diving ducks are the smallest of the so-called Sawbill ducks; Smews have small serrations along the inside of their bills, which are very helpful allowing them to catch and hold small fish. The males court the females throughout winter and pairs are formed by spring when they nest in tree and rock cavities.

A Robin fluffs up in Winter, helping him to keep warm.

The practice has managed to vaccinate over 1600 patients, including more than 100 housebound individuals, in just three weeks.

THE COPPERWHEAT DEVELOPMENT GOOD NEWS AT LAST!

The long-awaited development at Copperwheat Avenue has finally been green-lit in Reydon. The not-for-profit developer Orbit Housing has bought the site and is finalising details of the scheme, ready to apply for full Planning Permission.

At a recent meeting with Reydon Parish Council's Planning team, Orbit confirmed that the development will provide 220 houses made up of 44 affordable rented homes (at 80% of local market rent) and 74 shared ownership homes, including 30 properties developed with new funding from Homes England.

With a limit of 80% 'staircasing' - the process allowing shared owners to build up shares in their homes - Orbit will retain 20% of the equity of the shared ownership houses which should ensure that these houses stay as shared ownership as they change hands.

The scheme will also provide 84 open market houses, 11 plots for self-build/custom builds, and 7 plots to enable East Suffolk Council to offer replacement sites for owners of houses lost to coastal erosion.

There will be a mix of 1, 2, 3 and 4 bedroom houses but no 4 bedroom houses in affordable or shared ownership tenure. Reydon Parish Council is asking East Suffolk Council to confirm that there is no need for 4 bedroom affordable houses as we think there are some larger families locally who need these.

Construction access will be via Copperwheat Avenue and the Crescents, which are to be the main accesses to the development. The boundaries on all sides will retain the existing trees and be further landscaped. The houses will have a plain design (not unlike those in Barbrook Green) but will include weatherboarding on properties near the boundaries facing the countryside.

Orbit Housing will be holding a drop-in information event at Reydon Village Hall on **Wednesday 17th January between 4pm and 8pm,** to ensure Reydon residents are fully informed about the plans, and are made aware of the timelines for construction and letting.

Simon, who opened the Village Hall back in April 1977 after a long and difficult fundraising campaign, told us that it was his Grandfather P C Loftus who donated land to Reydon (Loftus Avenue) to stop the then Southwold Corporation building new houses on The Common.

It was Simon's Father Nicholas Loftus (Nicholas Drive) who donated the plot of land to Reydon Parish where Reydon Village Hall now stands. The Village Hall Management Committee thanked Simon very much for his inspiring, historical account.

Reydon Village Hall are very pleased to announce that the Noise Abatement Order, which was imposed on the Hall many years ago by the Hall's neighbours, has been declared 'null and void' by East Suffolk Council. The Village Hall will continue to be a considerate neighbour.

Next month The Village Hall's heating system will be upgraded throughout, replacing the original heaters (almost 50 years old) with infra red units. This has been funded by the Reydon Trust.
