LETTER FROM SOUTHWOLD

Southwold Town Council has had a busy start to the new year. The impact of the high level of rainfall is very clear. Potters Bridge has been subject of much debate. The ad-hoc agency meeting has developed a road map which identifies short-, medium- and long-term actions. There is a need for all the parties to work together. The Town Marshes have been flooded and STC has been working with its tenant farmer and the Harbour management team to clear the blockages in the dykes and ensure the sluices are working.

The consultation by the Roads Committee received 700 replies. The majority of respondents were in favour of the 20mph speed limit. The Council took note of the feedback and revised the amount of raised crossing points to two so as not to reduce the number of parking areas on the High Street. The selected resident parking areas have been maintained. These improvements will benefit both Southwold and Reydon residents. The project for improved signage is being costed. STC are installing two fast-charging outlets in Gardner Road carpark.

STC invited the Sizewell C Project Team to present their plans. There is a need for both parishes to work to together on the plans proposed. Recent news has established that the LionLink project, which has been subject to a scoping report, will focus on landfall options at Walberswick and Southwold, as well as the cable route to a converter station at Saxmundham and substation at Friston. Co-operation between both councils will be critical to fight this unwelcome challenge to our beautiful and precious Heritage Coast.

For the younger people of Southwold and Reydon, I am pleased to say that the Klondyke Skatepark project has been signed off and the new facility should be finished for the summer.

Menta, the operators for Station Yard Enterprise Hub, have now signed their contract. Workspaces and units will be available during May for occupation.

STC has agreed to fund a new website developed by Spring for Southwold and Reydon businesses and organisations, which will be available in the summer.

I have been very encouraged by the support for my mayor's theme of volunteering in the local area. Community Action Suffolk have organised three local events that have been well supported. The Pantry in Reydon and the Food Bank in Southwold are two important examples of what can be done in the community. I would encourage all to consider helping the community by thinking about volunteering to make a difference. It can be very fulfilling. Enjoy your summer.

THE NEW PARISH COUNCIL INFRASTRUCTURE GROUP

Take any train journey around the United Kingdom and you will see many thousands of much-needed new homes under construction, set in both green- and brown-field sites. The village of Reydon is no exception, with almost 300 new homes expected to be available in the next five to ten years on the Saint Felix School playingfield site, the Copperwheat green-field site, and other smaller developments.



Realistically, no one can be 'against' sensible economic development, as affordable housing, in whatever form, is badly needed and is currently in very short supply - particularly in Reydon and Southwold. Local businesses are short of staff, it's said, because there are not enough affordable homes available in the area for younger folk and their families.

With potentially up to 300 homes planned, Reydon could see an extra 1,200 residents living in the village, using approx. 600 cars, by the year 2034. The question has to be asked. . . can the infrastructure cope? Reydon Parish Council has put together a new working group to look into the impact of new housing developments on the village.

Some of the questions that have to be asked are:

- *Foul water and sewage disposal*: Will there be enough capacity at the existing Anglia Water treatment plant, or will there have to be an additional treatment plant, and where will it be situated?
- *Fresh water*: With many developments already being delayed in East Anglia due to a lack of fresh (drinking) water, will this affect development in Reydon?
- *The Sole Bay Health Centre*: Will there be enough doctors and other medical staff to be able to look after these extra residents?
- *Schools*: Can Reydon Primary School be expanded? Should a new school be built and if so where? Will all the secondary pupils still have to be bussed to Framlingham or Beccles?
- *Roads*: With the problems associated with Potters Bridge, Quay Lane and getting through Wangford, will construction vehicles be able to access these large building sites without paralysing the village?

Initially, the Infrastructure Working Group has asked for a meeting with David Beavan and Senior Planning Officers at East Suffolk Council. Watch out for future updates, either on the Reydon website (reydonvillage.org or in the next edition of *The Reydon Robin*, out in June.

Reydon Village Hall

It's a year since Reydon Village Hall's new Management Committee took over, with a new Chairman, Treasurer and Secretary, and an accessible online bookings system.

A lot has happened in the first 12 months. Perhaps the most significant development for both the Hall and the community has been the scrapping of the overbearing Noise Abatement Order imposed on the Village Hall over 20 years ago. This restriction had a profound effect, both on bookings and the Hall's reputation in the community. We will always remain a considerate neighbour. . . but, thankfully, Reydon Village Hall can now take future reservations for wedding receptions, birthday parties and music events.

The Hall recently staged a very popular ceilidh, with the Once Bittern Ceilidh Band and caller Poppy Price Dowhan, which raised over £400 for the Hall's Golden Anniversary Fund. It was so successful that further ceilidhs have been arranged for 13th July and 25th October.

The Hall is undergoing a transformation, ready for its Golden Anniversary in April 2027. This year, we have re-decorated the foyer and toilets, and have installed infra-red heating in the building with the help of a generous grant from the Reydon Trust. This system is efficient to run and we anticipate an estimated saving of electricity of 35%-40%.

We have also created a small meeting room, called the Loftus Room after the local family who donated the land the Hall stands on. This room is a conversion of the former bar area, and enables smaller meetings to take place whilst separate events are taking place in the Hall. When the bar is required for functions, the double doors into the Hall simply fold back allowing full use as a bar. All bookings: reydonvillagehall@gmail.com.

We are now applying for grants to fit new LED lighting in the Hall, to renew all the curtains to help with soundproofing and blackout, and to provide a state-of-the-art digital projector, screen and wireless sound system. This has been requested in the past, and with this facility, we hope to welcome a wider range of clients.

POTTERS BRIDGE UPDATE

Potters Bridge has not flooded since our multi-agency meeting agreed a 'road map' last month. Unfortunately, we cannot take credit for that. Neither the Environment Agency nor the landowner have been able to ensure that the outfall is dug before the broad depth reaches 1.5m AOD (Above Ordnance Datum; a mapping/surveying term meaning above an established baseline). The level has therefore been allowed to rise three times until it breached the beach. Luckily for the traffic, this is now happening before the road gets flooded because the beach has been eroded by repeated breaches.

Unluckily for the nesting birds in the reedbed, this means that the broad levels fluctuate by a metre, which will drown any nests. We are therefore moving towards the medium-term plan. Natural England is designing a bund to retain fresh water above the Bridge to save the upper reedbed habitat and the bitterns. County Highways has committed to clearing the tidal flap under the Bridge and the road drains this summer. East Suffolk has already swept the road ready for this. The Environment Agency is encouraging landowners up the Wren catchment to store winter rainfall for irrigation. We accept, however, that the road is slowly becoming a tidal ford, so we are looking at automatic real-time depth signs at Reydon and Wrentham crossroads. This will save the road closures that divert heavy traffic through Wangford, but still inform smaller vehicles of the danger - especially in the dark.

Long term, we need a new road into Reydon which is above sea level, but that is not going to happen this year! *Cllr. D. Beavan, East Suffolk Council*

SOLEBAY MENS SHED

Fifteen men attended the inaugural meeting on Saturday, 15th March in the Stella Peskett Millennium Hall in Southwold. The meeting was arranged to gauge the interest in setting up a Mens Shed on the Millennium Car Park in Mights Road for the catchment area of Reydon, Southwold, Wangford and Wrentham. This initial level of interest means that we can now progress to the next stage in setting up a working group to agree the type of building required and ways of working.

Sheds are mainly grassroots community activities that come about in response to shared needs. These have mostly been for men to access tools, workbenches, skills and opportunities to make and mend in the company of others.

Sheds bring health benefits by encouraging physical and mental activity and improved wellbeing by providing an enjoyable way to stay socially integrated in local communities by being creative and learning or passing on skills.

REMARKABLE TREES IN REYDON

I keep looking to see if the buds on my silver birch tree are starting to open. They are not! My tree is still asleep - or is it?

Like other deciduous trees at this time of year, my birch is busy behind the scenes. When it detects a soil temperature of 5 or 6° C, it starts to grow new roots which enable it to take up more water and minerals (sap) ready to nourish the new spring growth. The sap is mixed with sugars from the roots and rises up the tree in a network of tubes (xylem vessels).

If you put your ear to the trunk of a deciduous tree at this time of year (or use a stethoscope), you will hear the amazing crackling and gurgling sounds of the sap flowing up to the branches.

Bud burst actually occurs when a threshold of day length is reached which the tree determines by way of the optical filtering function of its bud scales which allow it to monitor the ratio of red light found during daylight hours to the far red light of the night-time hours.

Clever, eh?

NATURE NOTES

It's looking like a bumper year for the non-native invasive Alexander plant around our locality.

It defies our seasonal conditions and seems to germinate and grow readily at any time of year!

Milder, wetter winters certainly gives it a head start and its vigorous growth means that it outcompetes most of our native wildflowers, eventually to the point where our verges and field margins become an Alexander monoculture.

This year, the flower umbels were forming as early as February. Each individual flower is rich in nectar, which attracts many emerging insects which in turn attracts many birds.

This female House Sparrow is collecting insects to feed her chicks (can you believe they are Red Listed as bird of conservation concern?).

The Alexander plant is a love-hate paradox - it is invasive but it also benefits our insects and birds. Control does present a dilemma. It is a great plant for wildlife but a disaster for our native wildflowers. One solution could be to allow this plant to flower but not go to seed then cut and

clear, and repeat yearly. This could allow grasses and native wildflowers to get established later in the season. The collective noun has to be 'a march of Alexanders', unless one already exists?



Just in case you missed it, this Great Crested Grebe spent a very happy ten days feeding on freshwater shrimps which inhabit Southwold Children's Boating Pond in their thousands. Note its bulging crop: quite an expert shrimper.

In 1889, Emily Williamson established the RSPB. She was fed up with the inaction of mostly male ornithologists who were reluctant to oppose the fashion of using exotic bird feathers to adorn ladies'

hats at that time. Her

actions undoubtedly saved many Great Crested Grebes from this wanton slaughter as their feathers were in great demand. Thanks to Emily, we are able to enjoy observing this handsome bird today. **Bill**







THE FIRST WORLD WAR PILLBOX, MIGHTS BRIDGE... THE STORY SO FAR

The Parish Council is very pleased to announce that the purchase of the WW1 Pillbox for the community is almost complete!

After many years of local vandalism and general neglect by the landowner, the historic and rare building by Mights Bridge has deteriorated to the point that it is unsafe. On the instruction of East



Suffolk Building Control, it was filled with soil to ensure that it could not be vandalised further.

Fearing invasion from Europe, these concrete structures were built by the Royal Engineers in strategic places along the Norfolk and Suffolk coast, approx. 40 in Norfolk and 50 in Suffolk. In Reydon, this partially hidden bunker on the banks of Buss Creek, with look-out positions across the Marshes and the main road, would have defended access to Southwold and the Harbour. The landowner has finally agreed to transfer the building to Reydon Parish Council, together with a small circumference of land, for no fee other than the settlement of his legal costs. Once the transaction is complete, then Reydon Parish Council can apply for grants to restore the building for the community's use.

Very few of these World-War-One defence posts exist over a century later, so it is a piece of social and military history worth preserving. Suggestions for future use have included a 'living history' centre and a bat roost - an initiative approved by the Suffolk Wildlife Trust. COVID Spring Campaign - April/May 2024

Preparations for the NHS Spring COVID Campaign are underway. We anticipate the campaign to commence around the end of April/beginning of May. There is no need to contact the Surgery to book your vaccination as we will contact directly those patients who meet the eligibility criteria outlined by NHS England which is:

- Adults aged 75 years and over (those who turn 75 years old by 30th June 2024).
- Residents in care homes for older adults.
- Individuals aged six months and over who are immunosuppressed.

Prescription Ordering Direct (POD) closure

The NHS Norfolk and Waveney Prescription Ordering Direct (POD) service is closing. After 30th June 2024, you will not be able to order repeat prescriptions using the POD service. Sole Bay Health Centre GP Practice will be taking over responsibility for your repeat prescriptions. We recommend you use the online services, NHS App or SystmOnline via the Practice website to order your medication in future.
