INTRODUCTION AND WELCOME

Welcome to *The Reydon Robin* Summer edition, hopefully a little ray of sunshine for all Reydon residents (and increasingly beyond), some 2,500 households in all.

The Council's 'Reydon Star Awards' shone brightly in April (see the report on p.9), recognising individuals who have given so much to our community. If you know of anyone you feel should be recognised in this way, please let the Parish Clerk know for next year's Awards.

The Robin in its way is also testament to the strength of local groups, charities and volunteers, with this theme particularly strong in this edition. Then there is also the continuing Community Volunteer 'Register' in this edition at p.11.

But there are still challenges ahead, with housing developments continuing to make waves. With the Copperwheat development, a bone of contention has been access for construction traffic, as the article on pp.6-7 outlines clearly. Last month, the Council had a meeting with its developers Orbit Homes to tease out answers to this very issue. We were not satisfied with what we were told and have decided to recommend that the planning applications for this part of the development process be refused. We will continue to make sure local concerns are heard.

Then there was the 80th anniversary of D-Day. We at Reydon Parish Council marked it with a little wreath-laying ceremony, with councillors gathering at St. Margaret's on the evening of 5th June to hear prayers and a short address from Rev. Alan Perry before I laid a wreath on the village war memorial, later transferred to the memorial soldier now outside Reydon Village Hall (see this edition's cover). It was our way of marking such an important milestone and the sacrifice it involved. Many thanks to Kim Harvey and Kalvyn Friend for making this happen, and to Rev. Alan for agreeing to do this at such short notice, and for doing it so well.

Finally, our thanks go out to Doh Pizzeria for their support in so kindly sponsoring this edition of *The Reydon Robin*.

REYDON AND SOUTHWOLD COMMUNITY PANTRY AND FRIDGE

It's been just over a year since the Reydon and Southwold Community Pantry and Fridge opened its doors. As a food-waste scheme, the aim is to reduce what goes into landfill by redistributing donated food to anyone for free in the local area.

In the last year, the Pantry has achieved the following:

- Made 349 food collections.
- Collected 11,052kg of food.
- This is the equivalent of 26,315 meals.
- And made 32,374kg of CO₂ savings.

The Pantry is open every Friday between 9am and 3pm, and located at the back of Reydon Village Hall. It is run by a team of volunteers who drive to pick up donations every day of the week or who are at the Pantry to help the customers do their shopping. We are always looking for more volunteers to either pick up donations or do Pantry shifts of 9am-12pm or 12-3pm. If this is something you are interested in, please either pop in and speak to one of the volunteers or email us at: reydonandsouthwoldpantry@gmail.com.

We continue to get generous donations from the Co-op and Tesco in Southwold, Bookers in Lowestoft, and KFC in Lowestoft. This is alongside other local shops, organisations and individuals who also donate. It's now that time of year when local allotment holders and gardeners from Southwold, Reydon and Wangford pop in to drop off fruit, vegetables and plants, which our customers really enjoy picking up. David, who plants the fabulous displays on Reydon Corner, comes in to see us, and at the end of spring gave us lots of bulbs, which people have really appreciated taking.

Our furry friends are also catered for in the Pantry, with the donations we get from the RSPCA of dog and cat food being well received. And we also receive products from the local hygiene bank, which also makes a difference to people.

We recently took delivery of a large freezer, which was kindly donated to us by Foster Refrigerator and organised by Patrick Huggins. This will enable us to have enough space to ensure that we can freeze those large donations we get.

On behalf of the Pantry team and our customers, we would like to thank everyone who contributes to make the Pantry the success it is: the businesses that donate to us, the public who support us, all our volunteers and, lastly, YOU, our local and regular customers. Here's to the next 12 months, so pop in and say hello, pick up some lovely fresh and frozen foods, and, of course, do your bit to contribute towards reducing food waste.

LETTER FROM SOUTHWOLD

I have been re-elected by my fellow councillors to remain as Mayor for 2024/25 and I am honoured to accept this role again. One of my first duties was to open the Charter Fair on 30th May. Stocks Fair have now been coming to Southwold for 174 years. I attended Southwold Primary School and presented all the students with vouchers so they could enjoy a free ride. It is 50 years since the local authority changes occurred and it was celebrated by inviting previous councillors and local people who have contributed to success of the town for a Charter Lunch on the same day.

The Station Yard Hub building has now been completed. Menta, the operator, has started advertising the workspaces and units. They will also be supporting new business start-ups. The shop and flat are currently being advertised. Following the business meetings in the town, Spring have developed the Town Website, and all businesses and organisations in the area have been invited to join. There are also important consultations being held about the future of the Harbour and Caravan Site.

COPPERWHEAT CONCERNS

In 2018, William Denny & Sons and Chartwell Industries applied for Outline Planning Permission for a development of the field behind Copperwheat Avenue. Approval was granted in September 2021 and is to be delivered by Orbit Homes. The project comprised 220 houses (of which 118 are affordable) with two small access roads via The Crescents and Copperwheat Avenue.

On 17th January 2024, Orbit held a well-attended (non-statutory) presentation at Reydon Village Hall explaining their plans for the site. They appear to have been surprised by the strength of concern expressed by residents on a wide range of issues from pressure on school places and local services to traffic problems in Reydon and Wangford, and we understand that the full application was subsequently delayed.

Orbit is now preparing detailed plans for the housing development and other related issues, known as 'reserved matters', to submit to East Suffolk Council (ESC) for approval before work can begin. This is to ensure that they meet the 37 statutory conditions with which they must comply. To date, these documents cover the phased building plan, surface water, and pedestrian access.

In April 2024, Orbit submitted their Construction Traffic Management Plan to ESC. No residents were notified, and only by local word of mouth were some of us made aware of the proposals. In order to avoid the centre of Wangford, these included the ludicrous proposal that construction traffic, including HGVs, will access the site from Wangford Road (B1126) from the north via a one-way gyratory system, turning up Quay Lane from the A1095, and returning to the A1095 down Mardle Road (a designated Quiet Lane). A traffic 'shuttle' will also restrict traffic on Wangford Road to single file during construction and probably forever.

A meeting was scheduled for 23rd May between Reydon Parish Council and Orbit ahead of the monthly PC meeting, to discuss modifications to the development design. We were grateful that the Chair allowed residents to attend and put concerns directly to Orbit on the Construction Traffic Management Plan. The responses were not satisfactory: Orbit's position is that they have Outline Permission with approved access, so traffic will get there by whatever route they can manage, regardless of the consequences to residents. They did not countenance the possibility that no satisfactory route might be possible on the existing narrow and congested local road network, and regard this as the responsibility of ESC, who approved the outline application. Detailed approval appears to be only a matter of ticking boxes.

What is becoming increasing clear is that Copperwheat will produce a massive strain on Reydon's infrastructure. Along with St. Felix, 275 new houses are being added to the village housing stock. At an average of 2.4 people per house that equates to 660 new residents, all with cars - an additional 25% of the current population. This is at the very outer limit of what is considered acceptable under the Reydon Neighbourhood Plan (RNP). And, including the estimated 150 people already living on these two streets, almost one in four of the population

will access their homes through Copperwheat Avenue and The Crescents. Orbit reassured us at the meeting that they all have the option of walking to the shops and work.

What is also clear is that the process of gaining Outline Consent was the key time at which to raise concerns. Some residents did raise legitimate objections to the outline application in 2018, including the Southwold and Reydon Society; but there were also strongly expressed views (including local councillor David Beavan lobbying for the development) that the larger project should go ahead in response to the deepening local housing crisis.

The Orbit project was going to deliver 118 affordable properties, and 9.8 hectares of the 12-hectare site were already in the Local Plan. The RNP would be in place to represent the views of the community, and between the RNP and ESC, it was reasonable to believe that our interests would be protected. Unfortunately, it is becoming evident that the opposite is happening. Development is going to put a massive, unsustainable strain on Reydon - on services, amenities, schools, the Health Centre, our two shops, roads and parking - and produce profound changes to life in the village. With hindsight, it would appear that the process of reviewing the outline application was unsatisfactory in very many respects and that ESC, and Highways in particular, may need to look at the detail again.

Worried individual residents are now beginning to coalesce as a group to scrutinise the development properly. Revisiting the original application, there are many questionable issues. For example, the Transport Statement on which outline approval was granted was based on data collected in 2018 - five years ago - not at the height of summer traffic and ignored the B1127 Lowestoft Road traffic. Since then, Potters Bridge and Quay Lane have both been flooded and closed for extended periods. And there have been at least two serious accidents - one at the top and one at the bottom of. . . Mardle Road!

It is not clear what influence, if any, residents can have on the development going forward. Agreeing 'reserved matters' is between Orbit and ESC Planners. But residents should have a voice. We know the village and its road system; we can suggest material improvements to the development; and ultimately a development that is achieved with the support rather than the growing opposition of residents will contribute to a happier village - which must be in Orbit's interests as it hopes to sell a lot of houses here.

The Hall's Management Committee are committed to deliver a fully refurbished. re-equipped community facility in the heart of Revdon in time for the Hall's Golden Anniversary in April 2027.

With the generous help of the Revdon Trust, a new, metered infra-red heating system has been installed, replacing the original equipment, which will result in a 35-40% saving in power consumption. We have converted the old bar area into a self-contained meeting room - The Loftus Room - to be used for smaller meetings. When a bar is required, the double doors are folded back allowing the bar area to be fully accessible to the Hall.

We are now applying for funds to decorate the Hall, bring the disabled toilet inline with current health-and-safety requirements, and to provide a fully equipped digital sound and projection system for the Hall, as well as measures to improve the acoustics. We now have an accessible online diary, so anyone can see when the hall is available for booking: https://reydonvillage.org/about-reydon/amenities/

We have set up The Golden Anniversary Appeal Fund, and, as a charity, we have been awarded Gift-Aid status; so for every £1 donated, the Hall receives £1.25. Community fund-raising is well underway: our Quiz on 1st June, hosted by Charlotte Clark, took £800 before expenses.

REMARKABLE TREES IN REYDON

The Elder Blossom

Like the finale of a good firework display, the Elder tree presents the last and arguably, boldest splash of flowering splendour of any of our native trees.

It is from these highly scented umbels that elderflower cordial and elderflower fritters can be made.

The best time to collect them is when they are heavy with dusky yellow pollen drawing in extra interest by insects.

I enjoy a refreshing tea made by infusing the flower heads in cold water overnight. The dried flowers retain their potency over the winter and have a diaphoretic action (promotes sweating) that is used in traditional medicine to help the body deal with colds and fevers.

The beautiful garden variety of Elder, *Sambucus nigra* black lace, with its finely divided, almost black leaves and pink flowers, can be used in the same way as the wild plant.

The Cubs who went got to try their hand at lots of different activities, including archery, air-rifle shooting, climbing, abseiling, crate stacking, tomahawk throwing, bush craft, craft, science activities and water zorbs during the day, and some activities available to them in the evening were disco, bingo, film or board games, to name a few. The behaviour of our Cubs was amazing, and the joint team that enabled both groups to go needs to be congratulated for the work and effort to ensure all the children of both groups had such a great time.

SOUTHWOLD FOODBANK

The Methodist Church on East Green in Southwold closed in March 2022. I arrived as the Superintendent of the Lowestoft and East Suffolk Methodist Circuit in September 2022. As Superintendent, I have overall responsibility for all eight Methodist churches in the Circuit, but I was asked to come to see if I could plant a church in Southwold.

The Hunky Dory Vintage Shop began using the Church Hall in May 2022 and I started coming along to tidy up the building, and to sit and think and pray shortly after I arrived. With a team of helpers from St. Edmund's Church, I decorated the back room and furnished it with Salvation Army furniture.

My initial thoughts were for a soft-play centre in the Church, as soon as the pews were removed and the equipment bought. I considered a café or tea shop, and then, after spending time at our Foodbank in Hungate Church in Beccles, I realised that what was needed was a foodbank.

As you can imagine, this idea was treated with a great deal of scepticism. I was told that Southwold is a wealthy place and there are no people in need here. Even Trussell Trust were reluctant to get involved at first.

But I persisted and on 7th November 2023, I opened the Foodbank with my wife as my only helper. We were given a supply of food from Lowestoft Foodbank's warehouse and no one came for the first two weeks. We now have ten volunteers.

Various council departments have given us funding. David Beavan has given us a £2,000 grant and others are supplying us with equipment to help us to feed those 'non-existent people' in Southwold, Reydon, Wangford, Wrentham and Walberswick who need help.

The Financial Inclusion Team comes in to offer advice, along with Christians Against Poverty (CAP). Sole Bay Care Trust has given us £2,000 to provide 'food-in-a-bag', so that we can provide ingredients and recipes for people to make healthy meals. We do this fortnightly, and photographs of some of these meals can be seen on our Southwold Foodbank Facebook page.

At present, we are feeding approximately 60 adults and 30 children. During the winter, we have provided a warm space for people to come into and get warm, and sit and talk to old friends and new. We have a community of regulars who feel at home here and those who pop in from time to time.

The long-term plans involve making the Church building into a Christian community centre with café and that soft-play area that I originally planned.


