LETTER FROM SOUTHWOLD

Southwold has been busy this summer although footfall has been down 30% on last year.

The season of events, including the Summer Theatre, the Arts and Street Festival, the Harbour Festival, RNLI Lifeboat Day and the Music on the Green, have all been successful.

Looking ahead we have the much-anticipated Christmas Lights switch-on on Saturday 30th November and Blyth Valley Rotary are organising the traditional Christmas Day swim. Thanks must go to the tireless efforts of all volunteers behind the scenes.

In August the long awaited skatepark at the Klondyke was officially opened. A very special mention is given to the Community Skatepark group which made this happen.

The new 'Visit Southwold' website is now live and provides information for both residents and visitors. The new Tourist Information Centre in the Craftco Shop, in the High Street has now opened. Craftco are still selling their usual wide range of handmade crafts, ceramics, glassware, jewellery, art work, textiles and cards.

The Station Yard Hub had its official opening on 1st October. Menta the operator is helping the community to promote their businesses and have hosted a recent business meeting. STC also organised a 'Clean Up Southwold' event on 13th October to support the various volunteers who have been working hard to retain the appearance and cleanliness in the Town.

STC is very pleased to announce all these activities have culminated in winning an award of 'Suffolk Council of the Year' presented at the Suffolk Community Awards Ceremony. LION LINK - THE THREAT INCREASES

Thank you to Fiona Gilmore, Charlotte Fox and Glynis Robertson from Suffolk Energy Action Solutions (SEAS) for the latest about Lion Link, one of two proposals by National Grid Ventures to bring electricity ashore from the North Sea Wind Farms and from Europe.

One of the two sites being considered for landfall is just north of Southwold Pier car park, where an interconnector station might be built! From there cables are to be buried under our Areas of Oustanding Beauty (AONBs) through farmland around the north of Reydon.



This will be the Northern Cable Route which continues under the Blyth Valley and south to a huge distributor site near Saxmundham. The South Cable Route proposal is to bring cables ashore at Walberswick.

SEAS have been campaigning relentlessly for an alternative, less destructive plan, keeping all the cables undersea until they reach a brownfield site nearer to London, where the power is really needed.

In June 2023 National Grid Ventures served notices to local residents and landowners, threatening fines of £1,000 + law suits if access for surveys were obstructed. Quite clearly landowners had no alternative but to agree to permit access for invasive surveys on their land.

Between now and January National Grid Ventures' surveys are being carried out for the Northern Cable Route. This involves sinking bore holes 15 metres deep (almost 50ft) to analyse the structure of the soil. Similar surveys are being carried out on the Southern Route at Walberswick.

The next phase, depending on the choice of route, will be more invasive involving archaeological digs in 90m long (nearly 100yds) trenches, having a far more serious impact on the local environment.

REYDON

Being a Reydon Parish Councillor is a rewarding experience for those who want to help our community and would like to make a difference. Parish Councillors are volunteers.

Part of the role is to take part in and contribute to monthly meetings, where agenda items covering a range of topics are discussed. You help make the necessary decisions. It is hoped that you join one or more of the Working Groups or Committees.

If you would like to get a sense of how it works, please attend one of our monthly meetings as a member of the public. The dates are on our website: reydonvillage.org/

Some of the key responsibilities:

- Decision-making the Parish Council works as a team so it is helpful that you attend as many monthly meetings as you can.
- We are a main consultee on all Planning Applications for Reydon. At the meetings you have the opportunity to give your views on those applications and any other proposals that will affect the residents in our parish.
- Communication Councillors are responsible for reporting back to residents on issues affecting the parish, and communicating Council decisions.
- Planning for the future We need your help to get better services, facilities, open spaces etc. These issues are discussed in smaller Working Groups. . . are then reported at the next full Council Meeting where, if applicable, decisions will be made by all the Councillors.
- Housing developers make payments, Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL), to the Parish Council to support projects that benefit the community. The Parish Council prioritises the allocation of the CIL income to ensure that community benefits are realised. There are to be a significant number of new houses built within Reydon in the next few years. The CIL income will be substantial.

The Chair and the Parish Clerk are always more than happy to advise new and inexperienced Councillors - you only need to ask! We are all on the same side and have the same aim, to improve the quality of life in the Parish and support the residents of Reydon the best way we can.

A pair of Sanderlings, one with the remains of a mollusc, (below left) the other hoping to share the meal. These enchanting shore birds have a unique feature - no hind claw - which is believed to allows them to run faster and they can easily out pace a fast incoming tide.

Finally we have Dartford Warblers nesting in our locality. This wet and bedraggled Dartford Warbler was spotted at the end of September and really is a great sight on record for our area.




THE REYDON STARS

THE POTTER'S BRIDGE SAGA

As I write the road is flooded at Potter's Bridge and closed to all vehicles. I am exasperated that the landowners Mr and Mrs Jones have been allowed to get away with causing so many problems in our district, and I am calling on the Environment Agency to take court action. Hopefully our new MP Jenny Riddell-Carpenter will help.

For years the outfall was kept open by one man and a shovel. It all worked as well with an Environment Agency digger until Mr Jones refused access a few years ago. He said he would keep it open with his smaller digger but his efforts do not last long. He also does not dig the channel when it is needed, so the beach has been breaching to drain the broad and clear the road. This means that the freshwater habitat of the reedbeds is being lost to the sea and we are not only damaging vehicles

but also hindering access to vital destinations e.g. The James Paget Hospital.

Last February, Natural England agreed to create a bund to protect the reeds above the bridge, but nothing has happened yet. Suffolk Highways also promised to inspect the bridge and clear the tidal

flaps, which has not been done though they have cleared the road drains. Our community faces an avalanche of threats from an increasingly erratic climate with sea level rise looming. We need our statutory agencies to get their acts together to build resilience and protect us, and fast!

Editor's Note: Jenny Riddell-Carpenter MP visited Potter's Bridge recently with John Huggins and Rebecca Clatworthy to inspect the flooding level and the alternative road route.

She took considerable interest, and is contacting The Environment Agency and the Landowners. The local petition to save Potters Bridge has reached a total of 5,668 signatures.

At time of going to press, the water level at Potter's Bridge is falling. It's not known whether the outfall on the beach has been cleared, but the water is definitely draining away and the road should be passable again.

SOLE BAY HEALTH CENTRE

Winter Vaccination Programme 2024.

RSV (Respiratory Synctial Virus) Vaccination

- Eligibility: Patients aged 75-79 between 01/09/2024 and 31/08/2025, NHS England have placed a strict criteria for patients who can receive the RSV vaccine.
- **Booking:** All eligible patients have been invited by the Practice. When you receive the invitation, please call the reception team to schedule your appointment.
- Turning 75 Soon? Patients who turn 75 during this period will be invited to receive the RSV vaccine around their 75th birthday.

Influenza and COVID Vaccinations

- **Start Date:** The vaccination programme begins no earlier than October for most eligible patients. This is on advice from NHS England.
- Invitation Process: Sole Bay will invite eligible patients via letter or text message.
- Contact: Please wait for an invitation before contacting the practice.
- House-bound: Vaccination for these will begin mid-October and patients will be contacted advising when the nurse will visit.

Childrens' Flu Vaccinations

- Under 5 Years Old: Sole Bay will invite eligible children under 5 years old for the nasal flu immunisation.
- School-age Children: Vaccinations for children in school or homeschooled will be managed by the School Nursing Team. They will provide direct guidance on receiving the immunisation. The practice is unable to offer vaccination to this cohort.

QUAY LANE FLOODING - local feedback:

There's consternation and disappointment about the flooding of Quay Lane, only months after it was cleared by a contractor for Suffolk Highways. This single-lane road may seem insignificant on the map, but it is an essential route for farm machinery, delivery drivers and private cars. It cuts down the large number of vehicles coming through the village, and saves nasty emissions and journey times.

One local farmer observed: 'Quay Lane used to fill with water regularly during heavy rain, but it always cleared within a few hours. Since the pig farm arrived, the run-off seems to block the drains.'

Another local resident said: 'It was noted at the time that the debris from the flood clearance was left on the verges by the contractor and when it rained it was being washed back on to the road.'

Last year the pigs were moved to a different field. A local driver noted:

'I was passing the site on two occasions in heavy rain and noticed that the water was running down the Wangford Road, into Quay Lane and then into the drain. At that time I saw no evidence of silt coming off the field where the pigs had been.'

Whatever the reason for the flood, it is disappointing for everyone using Quay Lane that it takes an unusually long time to clear the lane once it is blocked. However it has been said:

'Compared to the A12, the A14 and other trunk roads in Suffolk, Quay Lane is a lower priority . . . it doesn't even have a road number.'

The Parish Council is trying to get this matter resolved as soon as possible, and Suffolk Highways have responded to say that they are dealing with it.

REMARKABLE TREES IN REYDON

Please do not get rid of your fallen leaves, if you are lucky to have any! Autumn's leaf fall is triggered by the release of a hormone, initiating a cascade of chemical reactions. These break down and release mineral compounds within the leaves, which are subsequently transported back down to the roots.

As the reclaiming of these nutrients is never complete, fallen leaves still contain a significant amount of potential plant food. When the leaves are gradualy broken down by soil organisms these nutrients are released back into the soil, in a form where they can be used by plants once again.

This re-cycling of natural fertiliser supports soil health, structure and biodiversity, all of which helps to ensure the health of the plants themselves. So this Autumn please bear this in mind before you throw away Nature's precious gift.
