THE REVEREND ALAN PERRY

After nearly 9 years at St Margaret's Church, Rev. Alan retired on December 29th as Team Vicar in the Sole Bay Team Ministry, looking after Reydon, Southwold and surrounding parishes. Alan had moved from Essex, where he had been a Head Teacher of St Edward's School and Sixth Form College in Romford.

Whilst at Reydon Alan increased congregations substantially and during the Covid pandemic he introduced live streaming of services, which continues to this day. He led pilgrimages to Israel, Palestine and Santiago de Compostela and was the driving force behind the new Interment Garden in the Churchyard.

Alan worked with Rev. Canon Simon Pitcher, for many years and indeed stood in for him when Simon took up his own ministry in Lavenham. Simon writes:

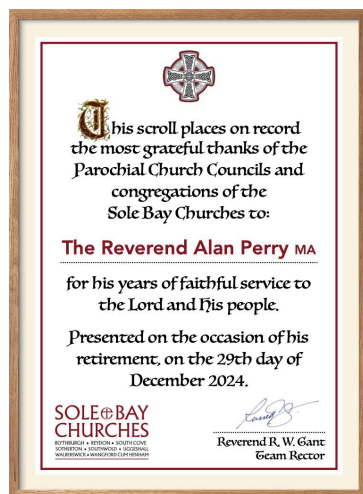

A TRIBUTE TO DAVID WOODS

REYDON CORNER 1940 - 2025

In January of this year, we heard the sad news that David Woods had died. David created Reydon Corner as a floral spectacle for the village, with all his own resources, and he built it up and maintained it for many years.

In the 1980s David owned two garden centres and a flower shop in South London and used to supply thousands of plants and landscaping for numerous flower shows, including The Chelsea Flower Show. David moved to Reydon in the late 1990s and took it upon himself to bring a bit of colour and beauty to Reydon Corner and created a few flower beds. Asked if anyone ever objected, David replied: *"I just did it, whether they liked it or not!"*

Over the years he added hundreds of bulbs and the wooden barrel planters to create the beautiful displays that are there today. Themes have included: The 2012 Olympics, The Queen's Jubilee, The Coronation of King Charles III and The RNLI Centenary.

David enjoyed sharing his exceptional plant knowledge and gardening advice with his neighbours, family, friends, passers by and those whose gardens he designed, planted or tended, whether they were window boxes on the seafront, or larger ornamental gardens.

He was also helped by his local family members with planting, planning, watering and deadheading, the younger ones of whom were especially keen if wheel-barrow rides with 'Grandad' were involved. Despite battling with ill health and poor mobility in recent years, David didn't give up and continued to work to keep Reydon Corner looking spectacular.

David Woods was one of the first recipients of a 'Reydon Star', presented to him by The Parish Council in 2023 for his outstanding contribution to the community. He was very proud to know that his gardening work brought delight and joy to the local residents and visitors to Reydon and Southwold. Reydon Corner continues to be an outstanding landmark for locals, and visitors from miles around. David will be greatly missed, but his legacy carries on.

NB: Reydon Parish Council will be dedicating a bench to David's memory on 11th April at 15.00 at Reydon Corner, followed by a memorial tea at Reydon Village Hall at 15.30. All are welcome!

OUR LIBRARIES . . . WHAT DOES THE FUTURE HOLD?

On 18th March Suffolk County Council (SCC)) voted to take all Suffolk libraries back in house, citing dissatisfaction about how the charity *Suffolk Libraries* has been running the service since 2012. Their contract with SCC runs until 1st June 2025, despite a petition with over 5000 signatures being handed in to SCC against the move.

SCC have stated that there will be no redundancies, and they pledge to invest more money in new books, public computers and the fleet of mobile libraries. So what are the concerns? Can SCC be trusted to deliver?

In Reydon and Southwold we are extremely lucky to have such a vibrant and engaging Library service, led by Charlotte Clark and her team. Charlotte says:

"We at Southwold Library are devastated that the achievements and hard work we have put in along with our volunteers, supporters and the rest of Suffolk Libraries over the past 12 and a half years, coupled with the amazing support Suffolk Libraries has had over the past three weeks, have still not been enough to convince the County Council to change its mind, or reconsider."

We are grateful to the thousands of people across Suffolk who have backed Suffolk Libraries' fight. The most important things to us at Southwold Library are our customers and our community, and we will continue to strive to offer them all we can, no matter who is running the service."

Suffolk County Councillor Michael Ladd writes:

"Suffolk County Council will be bringing all 45 libraries back under its care and control and will ensure continued access to high-quality, community-focused library services across the county. In addition, the council is investing £200,000 in mobile libraries, with a further £157,000 for new books and to replace the public computers."

Libraries are essential spaces for learning, connection, and support, and the Council is committed to ensuring they remain hubs that bring people together and envisage them becoming even more integrated into the wider community, serving as convenient access points for a range of essential Council services. This includes providing information and support around Adult Social Care, offering Health and Social Care services, facilitating Family Hub activities, and promoting digital inclusion."

NATURE NOTES

The East Anglian coast is an integral part of the East Atlantic Flyway, a vital route for our returning and departing migrant birds. We can expect (and welcome back) many Spring arrivals which will pass through our locality on their way north to their breeding grounds.

But first a chance encounter whilst driving along a lonely lane in Reydon. This Sparrow Hawk (left) perched and preening atop of a Hawthorn Hedge was quite unconcerned by my car, I managed to take a photo through the front window and was surprised with the result. Its not often you get so close to this stealth hunter; normally it's just a low-down, flying-flash of grey as it goes about its grisly business.



Of the many passing Migrants there are two in particular that I enjoy seeing one is this Ring Ouzel (centre) known as the Blackbird of the mountains. Sadly it does not nest locally, as there are no mountains in Suffolk. An early migrant can arrive in March and departs in September, the male sports a gorgeous white gorget, an unmistakable white semi circle spanning the base of its throat. In the female it is a lot duller.

The Northern Wheatear (right) which is also an early arrival in March with usually quite good numbers on passage along our coastline. The male is quite distinctive, the hen being much less colourful.

They prefer open country perching on low rocks or a prominent tussock, most often keeping near to the ground. In fact, they roost in a hole among rocks or in sheltered ground vegetation.

Nature Tip: Sadly our Bumble Bee population suffered a dramatic decline last year due to a very wet winter and spring. Planting a Buddleja Shrub known as the Butterfly Bush is a real boon for all pollinators, including Bumble Bees.

LETTER FROM SOUTHWOLD

My second term as Mayor has gone as quickly as my first. I continue to be amazed about how well our community works together with all the societies and volunteers providing a rich tapestry of activity. Our councillors have continued to oversee the business of the Town. The clean-up Southwold initiative in October was successful and this will be followed up in the Spring. The Christmas Lights committee again organised the excellent event in November which was well supported. Blyth Valley Rotary have been very active and organised a successful swim on Christmas day raising money for a range of organisations. There have been several road improvements which will benefit our residents and visitors.

I would recommend you attend the Southwold Arts Centre, which has recently reopened after a major refurbishment, including a new ceiling. Their programmes are varied and are attracting large audiences from across the region. The Tourist Information Centre at Craftco is fully operational and open. The Town Council will be further developing its website to attract visitors and keep locals up to date with events.

The Town Council has been very active with the National Energy Projects and are pleased the LionLink project will not be coming onshore North of the Pier. However, it is important all residents are aware of the implications of Sizewell C, Sealink and other infrastructure projects and the potential harm they can do to our community. The next major project for the Council is to understand the implications of the Devolution decision. Suffolk and Norfolk must put in their business plans by September 2025 to influence how the local government will be organised. Watch this space.

My Mayor's Charity Concert is on Friday 2nd May at St Edmund's Church to showcase local musicians and to raise money for the Music Trust charity which supports Southwold Primary School.

The Epic Half Marathon run on 2nd March was very successful. There are many events to look forward to including the Roubaix cycle event on 13th April, Dog Show on 19th April to raise money for Ukraine, the Lions Fete on 25th May, VE celebrations, the Arts and Street Festival starting on 21st June and another Harbour Festival on 28th June. The Summer Theatre will start in July. There is much to do and let's look forward to an enjoyable Spring and Summer.

NEW EQUIPMENT UP AT THE REC

The history of 'The Rec' – the Recreation Ground in Reydon in Cox's Lane, may be buried in the mists of time, but there's no question there have been many generations of equipment: swings, goal posts, slides etc. installed over the years.

Now, thanks to a sum of money from the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL), the money that property developers pay to the community, Reydon Parish Council have been able to spend over £70,000 on brand new play equipment, including 2 zip-wires, a wooden climbing frame, a mega swing and a multi-use games area which will be installed later on. Lighting will also be built in to promote team sports.

Sincere thanks must go to Nick Elvin for all his help disposing of old equipment, including taking down the old swings and breaking up and disposing of the 4ft deep concrete footings. Not an easy task. He has also put up new goalposts.

The new equipment will be officially 'opened' on Friday 2nd May at 4.00pm. All are welcome. Both Reydon and Southwold Primary Schools are holding a competition to design posters to publicise the opening, and both winners from each school will take part in the May opening ceremony.

THE REYDON & SOUTHWOLD COMMUNITY PANTRY

Situated at the back of Reydon Village Hall, the Pantry has had a busy eighteen months since it first opened in May 2023. It is not a Foodbank, but re-distributes foodstuffs and other items free of charge to anyone who visits during our opening hours of 12.30-15.00 on Tuesday afternoons and 09.00-15.00 on Fridays.

The food we give away is donated by a variety of stores, such as Co-op, Tesco, Adnams, Cornish Bakery, KFC and Bookers. In the summer months, supplies are augmented by local allotment holders who may have a glut of fruit or vegetables. We also provide dog and cat food, and toiletries and sanitary goods provided by Waveney Hygiene Bank.

The whole initiative could not run without the sterling work of our teams of volunteers: the terrific drivers who collect the goods every evening and deliver them to the Pantry, and the wonderful team who run the Pantry.

A two-week closure in January allowed for some major refurbishment, and the Hall looks very impressive at the end of it, if we say so ourselves! This included the complete replacement of the lights in the Main Hall (ceiling and dimmable side lights), replacement of the Main Hall curtains and blinds and a complete re-decoration of the walls and ceiling. Work is still ongoing to replace the disabled toilet and bring it up to C21 standards. We hope this will be completed very soon.

These improvements have only been possible, thanks to The Reydon Trust, Reydon Parish Council and our community, who have supported the Village Hall Management Committee's fundraising events. The next big project is to replace the floor covering with something longer lasting without needing resurfacing.

REMARKABLE TREES IN REYDON

The historical significance of Blossom

At the beginning of February the Pagan festival of *Imbolc* (Saint Bridgid's day) is a celebration of the first signs of Spring, and often coincides with the flowering of the Cherry Plum Tree with its cheerful display of white blossoms in many of our farmland hedgerows.

The next ancient festival of the year *Ostara*, is held at the Spring Equinox and celebrates the fertility of the Earth. It is the time of the flowering of another field hedge species, the Blackthorn. In stark contrast to its covering of bright snow-like blossom, the viciously thorny branches have long been associated with darker aspects of life.

In the old Celtic Tree Alphabet, Blackthorn is named *Straif* which translates to SULFUR, a word which lies at the heart of alchemical transformation. Like our Pagan ancestors many of us acknowledge the appearance of the pure white flowers of Blackthorn as the year transforms from darkness to light.

PUBLIC RIGHTS OF WAY

The days are longer, the weather is warmer and walking the network of public rights of way (PROWs) that criss-cross the Parish becomes ever more appealing. All members of our community are encouraged to enjoy this valuable resource.

Council do a sterling job in maintaining our pathways through the countryside, but if anyone encounters difficulty in using a PROW, the problem should be reported. The most effective way is to use the online reporting tool: highwaysreporting.suffolk.gov.uk/

As well as walkers enjoying our network of pathways, cyclists often take advantage of them, rather than using our narrow and increasingly busy roads. When cycling around the network of footpaths it is important to ensure the safety of pedestrians. Walkers should be given priority. Ideally, cyclists should dismount when passing pedestrians. Cyclists should take particular care where visibility is restricted. Please be aware that most of our PROWs are designated footpaths. There is no right to cycle on a public footpath.

Reydon Parish Council has recently formed a Footpaths Working Group. The purpose of the group is to monitor the condition and use of our local footpaths. Members of the group may be contacted via our clerk, whose details are on the Reydon Parish Council website: reydonvillage.org.

WELLBEING WALKS

Wellbeing walks are a great way of being more active, meeting new people and taking care of yourself. We are a friendly group who meet every Thursday morning at 10.30 on Jubilee Green. Walks take about an hour. After the walk we meet up for an optional tea or coffee in The Randolph. The walks are free and led by trained volunteers along tried and tested routes. Because you will be walking with a group you will feel safe, feel supported and have fun.

THE WORLD WAR ONE PILLBOX AT NIGHTS BRIDGE

It took over ten years to achieve, but Reydon Parish Council has finally secured at no cost the ownership of this historic monument, built in 1914. Its purpose was to protect the only road in and out of Southwold, in case of German invasion. There was great concern that the East Coast was a prime place for enemy landings, given the proximity to Germany, so many of these defensive and observation posts were built very quickly, along the coast.

Few pillboxes now, and because this building was so strategic Reydon Parish Council has put a steering group together to restore the building for posterity before the history disappears in the haze of time. Much work is needed to secure the structure for public use, and that will take funding.

With valuable financial support by the Southwold and Reydon Trusts, The East Suffolk Community Partnership, Hopkins Trust and the Cripps Trust a building has been purchased and is in the process of being fitted out so its doors can be open to all men within the Southwold, Reydon, Wangford and Wrentham catchment area at a membership cost of £20 per year.
