Reydon residents may have noticed a small group of walkers gathering on Jubilee Green every Thursday morning at about 10.30. I have been a walk leader for this group along with my colleague Robert, for a few years now. We walk mostly short routes around Reydon, no more than 1.5 miles.

We do however have one longer walk a month for those looking to stretch themselves! REYDON VILLAGE HALL

The Village Hall in Lowestoft Road has been situated at the heart of the community for nearly 50 years, providing the ideal facilities for a wide variety of activities, including social functions and public meetings.

We are very pleased to offer the only public Electric Vehicle Charging Points in Reydon, with four 7kwh points situated off road in our private grounds with unlimited, free parking. There are two points on the front drive and a further two at the back of the Hall. These charging facilities were provided with the assistance of the Plug-In Suffolk Network and have been very well supported this summer.

We now have a state of the art operator-assisted Defibrillator from London Hearts, registered on The Circuit, The National Defibrillator Network, which allows The Emergency Services to locate and access the equipment when needed, as quickly as possible.

The Village Hall has a raised stage with curtains, an equipped kitchen and seating for approx. 100 people. Together with the recently installed WiFi the Village Hall is ideally equipped for entertainment, lectures and club and local society meetings.

HIGHWAYS WORKING GROUP

Reydon Parish Council has recently formed a working party to look into issues with the main roads in and out of the village, such as speeding, lack of cycle routes and safety. We held our first meeting with Suffolk County Councillor Michael Ladd and a representative of Suffolk Highways in June.

Three traffic surveys are to be carried out on the Halesworth, Wangford and Lowestoft Roads so that we can gather data to support our argument for more measures to combat speeding in the village.

POTTERS BRIDGE - STOP PRESS:

The vital and busy B1127 road between Wrentham and Reydon is prone to regular flooding at Potters Bridge, especially in the winter months, and it is occasionally impassable, even closed. This can cause great inconvenience and danger, especially when vehicles cannot cross and try to turn around.



East Suffolk Councillor David Beavan has sponsored a new electronic system to alert drivers to flooding at Potters Bridge. Just approved by Suffolk Highways, a new automatic water depth sensor will begin trials in October and the water levels will be streamed initially to the Reydon website: reydon.onesuffolk.net If the trials are successful it is hoped to set up a subscription 'alert' for regular users.

SPEEDWATCH - Can you help us?

Cllr Brian Bailey recently stood down after 12 years as Co-ordinator of The Reydon Parish Speedwatch Group. Thank you Brian!

Reydon Parish Council are looking for a new Co-ordinator for Speedwatch, the local initiative which allows members of the community to become actively involved in road safety, by monitoring speeds at safe locations with speed detection equipment. The aim is not to catch as many speeding drivers as possible, but to reduce speed in areas of concern.

The Speedwatch Co-ordinator leads a team of local volunteers who monitor seven positions within Reydon, as well as maintaining the digital speed indicators on the roads in the parish. Digital speed indicators are an effective way of ensuring drivers are aware of their speed. The next generation of devices showing an angry face when drivers are speeding, and a happy face when their speed is within the limit, are even more effective and Reydon Parish Council are hoping to get one.

Brian Bailey adds: "The digital indicators are very accurate, so even if a driver is maintaining a steady 30mph and a higher speed is displayed, it means that another vehicle is coming up behind at a higher speed."

Pamela Cyprien, Chair of Reydon Parish Council said: "Reydon's Speedwatch Co-ordinator carries out one of the most important rôles in our community. Speeding in our built up areas is, unfortunately, a fatal accident waiting to happen."

NATURE NOTES: Woodsend Marsh & The Buss Creek Flashes

There's an abundance of nature literally on our doorstep.

These wet meadows are full of wildlife, but sadly today they are diminishing fragments of a rare and valuable habitat, which have been disrupted by humans for decades.



Perhaps presenting an even greater challenge are the rapidly changing seasons. Two years ago above average rainfall and the occasional tidal surge resulted in most of the marshes being flooded. Which was a bonanza for our overwintering geese and wildfowl Shovelers, Teal, Widgeon, Pintail, and the odd rare, shy Garganey duck.

In previous years they would stay and breed along with nesting Avocets, but with more sympathetic marsh management they may return one day to delight us once more.

However 2022 has seen the worst drought for over 100 years, yet our reed dwelling Warblers have successfully nested throughout the marshes and are currently feeding up in readiness for their long migrations.

The critically endangered Water Vole has carved (or rather burrowed) out a niche home along some of the quieter stretches of our local drainage systems. Quite remarkable when you consider that there are estimated to be just 870,000 of them left in the whole of the UK, compared to 75 million Field Voles!

FUEL SAVING when driving - WHAT WORKS FOR YOU?

As the cost of petrol and diesel fuel is already eye-watering, we thought it would be useful to continue The Reydon Robin's informal forum, focusing on saving energy when driving.

Many of these top tips have been widely publicised and may already be in use, but they are offered as reminders. These suggestions may only save a small amount of the household budget, but it all helps to make savings and less carbon emissions also help The Planet.

Do you need to drive? Easier said than done, particularly in a rural area with a limited bus service, especially if you have a disability or a very busy schedule. If you are only making a short journey, and can walk or cycle, then why not? Could you share a car with a neighbour?

Before you set off: If your car has a roof rack or a box, and you are not using it, think about taking them off. Any additional weight (both inside and outside the car) can increase fuel consumption.

Clear ice from your windscreen before you drive away. Idling while you de-ice wastes fuel. Plan and combine any trips. Cold starts waste fuel.

Check pressures. Under-inflated tyres lead to more fuel being used.

On the road: Smooth and gentle driving saves fuel. Don't accelerate sharply or brake suddenly. Read the road ahead and slow down gently.

Are you really in a hurry? Driving at 70 mph rather than 80mph can lead to 25% more fuel being used. Driving at 60 mph rather than 70 mph the figure is estimated at 15%.

Switch off your engine in traffic queues, and when you refuel, take just half a tank if you can as less weight means better fuel economy.

REYDON SPORTS AND COMMUNITY CENTRE



The new Reydon Sports & Community Centre on the Wangford Road is open and available for hire.

The land had been the playing field to Reydon High School until the school closed in 1990. After the formation of Reydon Playing Fields Charity in 2013 additional land was purchased and work on the building began.

The project has been funded by local grants from The Reydon Trust, The Southwold Trust, Reydon Parish Council, East Suffolk Council, Sport England, and The Football Foundation.

The late Barrie Remblance, former Chair of Reydon Parish Council, was one of the original volunteers and Trustees. Barrie was the main grounds man for many years, responsible for the grass cutting and pitch marking.

The pavilion has been built by local contractors, who have gone above and beyond to get the project completed. Many local volunteers have also given their time and energy, working on planning, grant applications and many other jobs behind the scenes, and there is now a newly formed Management Committee.

URGENT - DRIVERS NEEDED

The Voluntary Help Centre and The Sole Bay Community Bus Service (affectionately known as 'Mr Bus') both provide vital transport for those in Reydon and Southwold who need it. However, both services are very short of drivers.

The Voluntary Help Centre provides a community car service for anyone to use to get to medical appointments, shopping trips or other important journeys. Anyone with a Driving Licence and their own car can volunteer to help.

The Sole Bay Community Bus Service connects residents of Reydon and Southwold to the Sole Bay Health Centre, town centre and other local amenities. At the same time, it provides an opportunity for people to socialise with others using the service.


